**COME AND MEET OUR GOSPEL SHARING GROUP...** *'You are invited to join us at Gospel Sharing in which we read through the readings for the following Sunday Masses and then share our thoughts on what "these readings say to us". The discussions that follow are friendly and informal and very helpful to our understanding of the scriptures. We meet in St. Anne's Cloister on **TUESDAY AFTERNOONS at 2.00pm** for about an hour.*

**As we fondly remember Frank Doyle who died last month, we are pleased to share with you the eulogy that was given at his funeral mass. Please pray for the response of his soul and remember also Cathie and all Frank's family.**



*'Many of you would have known him as Frank... A few of us were privileged to know him as the Da or Granda. If you were a shipmate from the Irish Navy he might be known to you as Doyler, and if were a pupil at St Joseph's school around the corner you might have known him as Mrs Doyle's husband.*

*When Frank was born in Dublin in 1938, he wasn't called Frank or even Francis – in fact he wasn't officially named until he was six months old – why? Because his father, The Da, naturally, wanted him to be Thomas after him, however throughout her pregnancy his mother had prayed at the Church of St Francis Xavier. Ultimately, her strong faith won out. And thus established three things that shaped my Dad's life: Faith, Family and Fortitude.*

*Frank fought the odds from the start. Before he was seven, he'd lost two brothers and his mother to TB. Despite his father's best efforts, the times meant he was separated from his sister, Kathleen, who was taken in by an Aunt. He and his younger brother Tom went to an orphanage. Fighting for his brother is something he learned to do, but he was lucky: His father remarried, to Kitty, our Nana, and Frank was once more part of a loving family.*

*He was a bright child, who loved reading and maths, he was awarded a scholarship, but needed to leave school at 13, and got a job in a laundry. His teacher, Tom O'Halloran had given Frank a lifelong love of music – he sang in a choir where he lived in Cabra with Dickie Rock, Ireland's answer to Cliff Richard. In later life, he played the Harmonica, Tin Whistle, Bodhran, Accordion and, when he retired, he took up the Fiddle. Even though he was a novice, it didn't stop him joining in with sessions at the Bicton Pub, or when visiting Ireland.*

*As soon as he was old enough, Frank joined the Irish Navy in Cork. It may not have taken him too far out of Irish waters, (he called it wooden ships and iron men) but this is where he developed his love of boats and photography. Thanks to the Navy, he met his best friend Joe, who he introduced to his sister. And it's where he met my mother, Mary. Frank always said Naval life wasn't for a family man, so he and Mary moved to England, to be closer to his parents and brothers, Tom and Arthur, who'd already headed to Swindon. Frank and Mary married on this day in 1962, a day before Joe and Kathleen.*

*Tomas, myself and Maria followed. But Fortitude would need to come into play once more, as my mother lost her life to cancer when she and Frank were just 35. His faith, and the assistance of the family and church community carried him through. We were just 10, 9 and 7. But he was determined that whatever happened we would stay together, and he'd be Mum and Dad to the three of us. It was during this time that he thought it would be a good idea to join Yeovil Town Band... it allowed Frank to pursue his love of music with the added benefit that it was something that the whole family could be involved in and something Tomas, Maria and I look back with fondly. Like the film "Brassed*

Off", but 1970's Somerset style. Lots of great music including Terry Wogan's *The Floral Dance*, but also a strong tight knit community that was important to Frank at this difficult time.

Frank had moved to Yeovil, because he'd got a promotion (managing to escape Swindon) with London and Manchester Assurance company – a job he'd taken on after working three others simultaneously: For Arkells Brewery, selling Vacuum cleaners door-to-door and evenings at a bowling alley. A tale he may have told us once or twice. As we all know, he loved a story... though if he ever started one with "now this is a True story..." you knew instantly it wasn't, and you would enjoy another of his jokes. But while he loved the banter, maybe washed down with the odd pint of Guinness, he also liked a debate and importantly loved to fight for the little man.

He was Chair of the Governors at St Gilda's school Yeovil – which is where he met Cathie, wowing her with his best china (bought the day before) and (alleged) love of Neil Diamond. Shortly after they married, a further promotion took Frank and Cathie to Devon. It was here that we welcomed our sisters Jane and Emily, and completed the family.

Cathie insists the thing that she and Frank were most proud of, was there five children, five fabulous human beings who care deeply about each other. It always made them feel they must have done something right. Family was at the heart of everything for Frank, he enjoyed having his now large family around, Birthdays and Christmases with so many always felt like an event and he'd make his annual foray into the kitchen – to destroy the Christmas ham. Here in Devon, he rekindled his love of boats, and after his retirement, spent many a happy day with the love of his life: Phoebe of Fowey, his gaff cutter. He sailed her across to Ireland, for the 50<sup>th</sup> anniversary of the Irish Navy, heading down to Cork via Dublin. He was part of the Exmouth community: as launch authority and Honorary Secretary of the RNLI, Cruiser Captain for the sailing club and a eucharistic minister here at the Holy Ghost.

Frank said he had the support of four women in his life: His mother, Christina, his Ma, Kitty, Mary and Cathie – and it was Cathie he said had the biggest job to do of them all: nearly 46 years together. Parkinson's took away Frank's chance to have a long retirement with Cathie, curtailing their motorhome adventures to Europe, and trips to watch the Cricket. He lost his hearing, and although he could no longer play music, it couldn't dampen his humour, and his spirit remained strong to the end. Perhaps it's because of his love of his family he fought the disease for so long, but undoubtedly because of Cathie's care.

As well as a wife and five children, Frank's survived by seven grandchildren: Jonty, Max, Charlie, Kitty, Ted, Bea and Alex – his loving family, and when the end was nearing, he got upset at how he didn't want to leave them. After Frank's death Emily found a post-it note in a bible at home, with his writing on it marking out Lamentations 3:17-26... in his version it says..

"I have forgotten what health and peace and happiness are. I have not much longer to live; my hope in the LORD is gone". It continues... "hope returns when I remember this one thing: The LORD's unfailing love and mercy still continue, Fresh as the morning, as sure as the sunrise. The LORD is all I have, and so I put my hope in him."

Dad's full name was of course Francis Thomas Doyle. The Motto under the Doyle family crest is *Fortitudine Vincit* – which translates to "he conquers by fortitude". And Frank certainly did.

**ARE YOU GOING INTO HOSPITAL?** *The Hospital Chaplaincy telephone number: 01392 402024. A message can always be left there. The Blessed Sacrament Presbytery number can also be used: 01392 274724. It is now more difficult for members of the clergy to request information regarding your stay in hospital, including which Ward you are in. This is now regarded as confidential information and will not readily be supplied to any caller without the specific permission of the patient. If you are admitted to hospital and would like a member of The Chaplaincy Team to visit you –*

**DO .....** *Please inform the Chaplaincy Department which ward you expect to be on and when you will be there, if you know in advance that you are going into hospital. Specifically inform a member of the ward staff that you would like to be visited by a chaplain ensuring that you state which denomination you belong to. Inform your relatives about your wishes concerning visits from a chaplain if you are taken into hospital unexpectedly. Your relatives can then notify the Chaplaincy Department*

**DON'T....** *Just presume that the chaplains will hear about your stay in hospital – they probably won't. DON'T expect ward staff automatically to let the chaplains know you are in hospital.*

**ACT.....** *If you wish to be visited by a member of The Chaplaincy Team during your stay in hospital, the Hospital Chaplaincy telephone number: 01392 402024. A message can always be left there. The Blessed Sacrament Presbytery number can also be used: 01392 274724.*
